**Biographical history:** Ewers, Gordon (1924-2000) Palestine Policeman

Born 25<sup>th</sup> January 1924 in Brislington, Bristol. Siblings: Leonard, Charles, Alwyn & Jean. Left school aged 14 and signed on to work on a merchant ship (SS Boston City), but he found the working conditions of a deck boy too hard. The ship travelled between Swansea and Montreal/New York throughout the year, and as he suffered constant sea-sickness, he did not also want to be scrubbing decks when it was 20 below. By the beginning of World War II he had left the sea for a job in the food industry at Smith's Crisps. As soon as he was old enough, he tried to follow his two older brothers into the armed forces but was considered to be in a protected occupation. Eventually in late 1943 he managed to sign up for the Palestine Police and left England on 19 Oct 1943. The ship he travelled out on was torpedoed in the Mediterranean; and an American destroyer came to the rescue. All of those rescued were landed at Naples where they waited another couple of weeks for another ship. He arrived in Jerusalem 13 Dec 1943 and took his initial police exam on 31 Jan 1943. After basic training in Jerusalem, he was sent on his first posting to Haifa on 14 Mar 1944, where he stayed until 15 Apr 1945. Gordon spent much of his time based at Haifa. He received a gunshot wound to the lower leg. He also lost a couple of police mates. After Haifa he was then stationed at Latrun until 24 Nov 1945. After returning to the UK in 1946, he trained for the Fire Service based in Salisbury. He was a fireman for a relatively short time. Eventually he got a job in a timber yard in Newton Abbot, Devon. He married and set up home in her village of Kingsteignton. He rose to yard foreman before moving into sales at the time of the introduction of DIY shops. He spent the rest of his working life promoting new products to the DIY sector. He tripped over in early January 2000, and was taken to Torbay Hospital where they found he had broken an arm, unfortunately whilst in hospital he contracted flu and died.

**Scope and content:** Army pass, diary, press cuttings scrap book, Red Cross certificate, photographs and certificate of discharge relating to Gordon Ewers service in the Palestine

Police, including time at the training school in Palestine and his first posting to Haifa. The diary documents the new recruits' training and study regime, how their free time was spent and how life in Palestine differed from life at home in England. The press cuttings scrap book, created by Ewers holds cuttings of news stories and articles relating to the Palestine police, sabotage, assassinations, to plague outbreaks, snow in Jerusalem and escaped prisoners. The photographs depict the life of the new trainees, including their living quarters and practice exercises.

| 2 | <b><u>Diary</u></b><br>Diary written by Gordon Ewers while in Jerusalem at the Palestine Police Depot and Training school. The diary documents his first year of training in 703 Y Squad. Within the diary are accounts of day-to-day living, how free time is spent and the wait for correspondence from friends and family back home. Also documented are the training routines including P.T training, root marches, rifle training, law lessons, fake accident scenes and exams. Ewer also writes of his first posting to Haifa, how the new recruits had to escort Romanian refugees to camp and go out to perform road checks. | 3 | <b><u>Press Cuttings</u></b><br>Scrap book of newspaper press cuttings created by Ewers during his first year at the Palestine Police training school in 1944 and cuttings during his first year on duty 1945. Examples of the press cuttings included are the unsuccessful assassination attempt on of Sir Harold MacMichael, the assassination of Lord Moyne, raids of police stations, the start of 24hr police radio in cars and a cutting on Ewers own escaped prisoner Jules Von Rottrick.
