Biographical history: Wilson, Hilda Mary (1904-1990)

Born 4 Sept 1904, daughter of Donald Marten Wilson, clerk in holy orders. Educated at Wolverhampton Girls' High School; Norwich Girls' High School and St Hugh's College, Oxford 1923-1926 Lit. Hum (Classics), Hon. Classical Mods (1926) and BA (1927), passed groups B1 and B6 (1926). Assistant Mistress at St Mary's and St Anne's Abbots Bromley; Abbey School, Reading (1927); vice-principle, Jerusalem Christian College [possibly Jerusalem Girl's or Boy's College 1935-1936. Served as a school teacher at the Arab High School at Bir Zeit during the Arab Rebellion 1937-1939. In her correspondence to the Archive in 1968 Miss Wilson notes that the typescript was 'based on my diary for the year 1938 (September) to 1939 (June) when I was teaching at the Arab High School at Bir Zeit, Palestine. The Arabs at that time were in revolt against the British Mandatory government, on account of its Jewish policy. Bir Zeit is a village six miles north of Ramallah. During that year the British government in our neighbourhood ceased to function, for a time, as the rebels took over. In correspondence with friends in England I found that people in England had little idea of what was actually going on in Palestine. So I kept this detailed diary, and on returning to England at the outbreak of World War II (autumn 1939) I typed out a narrative version and tried to get it published. No publisher would take it, because – they told me – it contained things derogatory to the British troops, and such things could not be publicized in wartime. So I waited and tried again when the war was over. I was then told that these matters were out of date and nobody would be interested any more.' Miss Wilson also noted that 'unfortunately I have not kept the actual diary from which it is taken. But it is a true account; only the names of people have been changed.' After her work in Palestine, Hilda Wilson worked as a secretary to Lord Walsingham, Norfolk Home Defence Co. (1939); gardener and lorry driver at the Radcliffe Infirmary, Oxford (1941) and secretary to a firm of hard court specialists (1944). Hilda Wilson died in Devon on the 12 Nov 1990.
