Administrative history: Palestine Police Service Record Cards

The Palestine Police service record cards are personnel records for individual Palestine policemen. The service record cards have a standard format and are arranged by service record number, rather than by surname. The Palestine Police Service record cards are divided by citizenship into British service records and Palestinian (Jewish and Arab) service records. There is also a set of service records for Palestinians who were employed in the prison service.

From the surviving Palestine Police service record cards, it appears that this record keeping system was started in the 1930s and continued until the end of the Palestine Mandate in 1948.

The Palestine Police reused service record numbers, which was the same number as a policeman's badge number. When a policeman left the force and handed in his badge, the next recruit would have been given that service number. Consequently, two or three men may have served with the same service number. From the surviving records, it appears that the Palestine Police did not keep the service record cards of those who had left the force, for those who had been promoted to higher ranks and for those who had died in service. Information for those who had been promoted to higher ranks (assistant superintendent and above) can be found in the Palestine Civil Service Lists. The surviving records for British policemen are therefore predominately for those who served until the end of the mandate in 1948, or who were the last to serve with a particular service record number.

The Palestinian service record cards that have survived are only for those who served until the end of the Palestine mandate and were discharged because of the termination of the mandate. At the end of the Palestine mandate, the Palestine Police Service record cards were transferred to the United Kingdom. They were managed by the Colonial Office and transferred to the Department of Technical Cooperation on its creation in 1964. The records were mainly used for pension purposes and were eventually managed by the Department for International Development, Overseas Pensions Department. By 2003 use of the records for pension purposes had diminished but the records were recognised as having historical value. As The National Archives was not in a position to take the records at that time, the Palestine Police service record cards were given to the Middle East Centre Archive, St Antony's College in March 2004.

Scope and content: Palestine Police service record cards for British and Palestinian policeman 1930s-1948, as well some service records of Palestinians who were employed in the prison service 1920-1948, as for example, messengers, typists, clerks, engineers, teachers and translators. The majority of the records (63 boxes) are for British Palestine policemen and a smaller set of the records (12 boxes) are for Palestinian Palestine policemen and there is 1 box of records for Palestinians who were employed in the prison service. The Palestine Police service record cards have a standard format and include information such as force number (service number), full name, father's name, nationality, date and place of birth, previous occupation or trade, marital status, information on next of kin, the date of enlistment and appointment, a photograph and signature of the holder, education, appointments and promotions, divisions at which the holder served with dates of transfers, leave register, medical history, family register (such as date of marriage), commendations and rewards, punishments and particulars of discharge. Not all of the service record cards have photographs and the quantity of information filled out in the cards varies.

In addition to the Palestine Police service record cards, there is also a set of Palestine Police Service record files, which are arranged by surname and include additional information such as leave and last pay certificates, contracts, service registers, reports and papers relating to pensions. These files had been given to the British Empire and Commonwealth Museum. Upon the closure of the Museum, the records were transferred back to the Department for International Development, which then became the Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office. In 2023 the records were pending transfer to The National Archives.

The British service records were in bundles in which the original order mostly remained but bundles overlapped and stray cards were out of sequence. <u>1 box</u> <u>1920-1948</u>

Service records of Palestinians who were employed in the prison service. The service records include name, religion, date of birth, the date of entering Government service, a list of appointments, increments, transfers and promotions, as well as leave taken. Jobs included, for example, messenger, typist, classified clerk, assistant mechanic, engineer, teacher and translator. The service records are arranged into two series labelled 'Serial no 1 - 43' and a series with roman numerals 'I – XVII', as well as one stray card with no series label.

<u>Palestinian Palestine Police Service Records</u> <u>12 boxes</u> <u>1943-1948</u> Palestine Police service record cards for individual Palestinian policemen. The Palestinian Palestine Police service record cards only survive for policeman who served until the end of the mandate and were discharged as a result of the termination of the mandate. Service records for policeman who left the

force prior to the end of the mandate are not included

in this set of records. The term Palestinian refers to citizenship and includes both Jewish and Arab policeman, as well as other ethnic and religious groups with Palestinian citizenship.
