Biographical history: Wigan, Thomas Keble (1892-1957) Barrister-at-Law, Lincoln's Inn.

Born 22 November 1892, second son of Charles and Cecilia Wigan. Educated at Radley

College; Christ Church, Oxford. 1914-1919: Served with the 1/6th Battalion, Devonshire

Regiment in India and Mesopotamia; promoted from Second Lieutenant to Lieutenant then

Captain in 1916; mentioned in despatches twice. 1919-1921: Assistant Political Officer,

Mesopotamia; July-October 1920: in the siege of Kufa. 1920: General Service Medal 1920,

with clasp for Iraq. 1921-1923: Under Secretary to the High Commissioner of Iraq, Baghdad.

1925: Called to the Bar by Lincoln's Inn, London. 1940: Served in Home Guard. 1941-1945:

Served in the British Military Administration in Eritrea and Dodecanese (Royal Army

Ordnance Corps), and then as a civilian judge in the High Court of Abyssinia under Emperor

Haile Selassie. 1947: Justice of the Peace, Surrey. 1956: Bencher of Lincoln's Inn. Married,

1927, Katharine Ruth Sims Williams – 1 daughter, 1 son. Died 6 March 1957.

Scope and content: Six letters written by Thomas Wigan to his family during the siege of

Kufa in Mesopotamia (Iraq) in 1920. The letters describe fighting during the siege including

shelling, as well as documenting dwindling supplies, especially of tobacco and cigarettes, as

well as food. The letters describe the difficulties of isolation, rumours and a lack news of the

military situation, as well as airdrops of supplies. The last two letters include an account of

the relief of the siege, as well as Thomas Wigan's views on the political and military situation

in Iraq.

	Letter from Thomas Wigan to his mother [Cecila Wigan]. The		
	letter describes a double bombardment, that they will shortly run		
	out of tobacco and that 'to help fill the time' Thomas Wigan had		
	decided to read 'the bible through from beginning to end.'		
3	Letter to Gwen Wigan (sister)	27 Sept 1920	1 sheet
	Letter from Thomas Wigan to his sister Gwen [Gwendolen		
	Wigan] on the 70 th day of the siege. The letter describes the		
	military situation – 'though we could probably force our way out		
	without excessive casualties, we should not get ten miles before		
	the enemy would be round us a like a swarm of angry bees.' The		
	letter describes dwindling food, but that they received one box		
	from an airdrop, which had cigarettes and tobacco.

	Letter from Thomas Wigan to his father [Charles Wigan] on the		
	83 rd day of the siege. The letter describes dwindling food		
	supplies and efforts to shoot pigeons and catch fish, but that they		
	still had rice, barley and horse meat.

	Letter from Thomas Wigan to his mother [Cecilia Wigan], which		
	describes the breaking of the siege on the 17 th October 1920.

	Letter from Thomas Wigan to his mother [Cecilia Wigan] in		
	which Thomas Wigan describes the political and military		
	situation in Iraq, as well as the arrival of mail and the retrieval of
